





PET PARTNERS CANINES ARE PATIENT LISTENERS ENCOURAGING CHILDREN TO READ

Good readers enjoy a world of adventures at their fingertips and the ability to learn anything throughout their lives. But it's crucial that those skills are developed at a young age. Now, a group of local Therapy Dog owners and their kid-loving canines are helping children open those doors through Pet Partners reading programs.

Pet Partners therapy dogs and their humans visit libraries and schools in Prescott and Prescott Valley encouraging children to find the joy in reading, many by reading to the patiently listening dogs.

Lana Fielding has worked with Pet Partners, a national organization, for five years. She is co-founder of Pet Partners of Prescott and currently participates with her Yellow Labrador rescue, Tama. She joined the Pet Partners group because she wanted to volunteer at Yavapai Regional Medical Center after she retired.


"Pet Partners is the (Therapy Dog) organization the hospital uses. The organization has one of the best programs and guidelines that I have found. They also give their teams 100 percent support," Fielding said.

Fielding and Tama visited this summer with Prescott's Abia Judd summer school. Tama is a hit because he loves everyone, young and old, Fielding said.

Fielding, like most Pet Partners participants, has poignant stories about how her dog has touched the lives of children.

"One little boy had a very hard time with most words. After he had his turn he came two more times to read with Tama, then a big hug for Tama when his time was up. Another child was sitting in our group and all of a sudden he started





crying. He lost his dog recently and was able to express to all of us how much he missed his dog and was glad Tama was there."

The other half of Pet Partners of Prescott's founding team is Lauren Zaffuto. Zaffuto knew another person with a poodle therapy dog, who gave her contact information for a breeder, and Standard Poodle Bailey joined the family.

Zaffuto had discovered therapy dogs 20 years ago, but had to wait to participate. "I knew I wanted to do this because I saw how dogs made a difference. I had to wait 15 years until I retired to get Bailey, and he is perfect," she said, noting that Bailey loves children, and seems to know who needs his attention and how best to engage them.

Zaffuto joined the national Pet Partners so she could volunteer at YRMC as well. "Pet Partners has high standards, testing the handler and the dog in an evaluation that increases in intensity. We must re-evaluate every two years and complete ongoing education. Advocacy is important as well. Pet Partners is involved on the state and national level, educating our representatives about the importance of the human-animal bond and the difference it can make in a person's life. For children, that's extremely important. Reading to an animal builds self-confidence and can lay a strong foundation as children grow up."

This past summer, Zaffuto assisted with the summer reading program in Prescott and volunteers with a Prescott Unified School District social worker in preschool and K-2 special needs classes.

Prescott Valley Children's Library Director Lynette Christensen heard about Pet Partners when member Julie Stewart contacted her about bringing the program to the PV Library. A dog lover herself with a Pointer named Shelby, Christensen knew right away that this would be a great fit for the children who visit

"Children love interacting with animals, and this program helps them feel comfortable while improving their reading skills through practice with acceptance and no correction," she said.

Prescott Valley brought the program in for the summer, and it has been an amazing success. "The dogs are so mellow and their humans so patient with the children."

Julie Stewart participated this past summer in the Prescott Valley Library program with her Cavalier King Charles Spaniel Griffin. Stewart joined Pet Partners with Griffin because, she said, therapy dogs are a way for children to receive unconditional love and care. "Each therapy pet knows how best to help the child; it is quite precious to witness."

Stewart has first-hand knowledge of how a little extra help can make a difference for a child. "As a child I had difficulty reading, and dyslexia. My family provided tutoring help in the third grade. That changed my life, and I am very grateful. Pet Partners is a way to give back to the community."

She enjoys seeing children relax and become confident in their reading abilities as they interact with Griffin. "They feel safe, wholly accepted, and confident to be who they are," she said.

Debbie Zdanowicz said she chose to participate in Pet Partners with her Irish Setter Megan.

She visits reading programs at the Prescott Valley Public Library and in Prescott at Lincoln Elementary School.

"We were losing our 11-year-old Irish Setter to cancer and found an Irish Setter litter in North Carolina. The puppies' mom and dad were on the premises, and the owners home-schooled their six children. We knew the puppies would be well socialized. Megan was well worth the trip," Zdanowicz said.

She came into the Library reading program because her mother, an elementary school librarian, instilled the love of reading in all her children. "Did you know that if you are not a good reader by the end of the third grade, it affects your whole life? But it's the kids and Megan's interactions that I now enjoy," she said.

She loves that the program teaches children that reading can be fun. "It's fun to read to a dog in an environment that is non-judgmental, comfortable, and without peer pressure. The child gets reading practice that helps improve vocabulary and comprehension. If it's fun to read, the child will read more," she said.

Zdanowicz had one student in second grade read to Megan. The same student read to the dog in third grade and summer school. "I told the student if she wanted to continue reading to Megan to pick more difficult books as she is reading very well. The student followed up with a thank card saying how much she loves Megan."





Many people know former Prescott Valley Police Commander Laura Molinaro through her career, but more know her canine companion Cruiser, a "tripod" pup rescued from a New Mexico reservation. Cruiser was an injured and terrified terrier mix when he landed in the Chino Valley Animal Shelter.

Several years later, Cruiser is now a much beloved visitor to the Yavapai Regional Medical Center (East and West Campus), the Veteran's Administration Medical Center in Prescott, the Town of Prescott Valley Civic Center and Library. He is no longer afraid, and in fact, even after his rough start, overflows with love of people and especially children.

"Cruiser seemed to lead me toward Therapy Dog work – it was almost as if it was his calling, his purpose in life," Molinaro said.

This past summer, Laura and Cruiser joined the pilot Pet Partners reading program at the Prescott Valley Library. Cruiser is delighted to interact with the children, and his missing limb opens many discussions with children and adults about how we can thrive in life even with difficulties. (Read Cruiser's entire story at PrescottDog.com, the November/ December 2018 issue).

"Cruiser's favorite humans are kids. He gravitates towards them whenever he sees or hears them," Molinaro said. "He is just drawn to these small humans. Perhaps he senses their innocence and wishes to connect with that feeling. Perhaps it is their size; they are a little closer to his level than adults.

"The sight of those small hands stroking his fur gets me every time. I sometimes wonder what passes through that touch and hope these kids never lose the ability to convey the love and kindness they show him. It is genuine, never forced, and I think Cruiser senses that and revels in it."

She loved participating in the PV Library program this summer and hopes to see one like it at a future time at the Dewey-Humboldt Public Library. "Not only does (the program) help children practice their reading in a safe environment, but at the same time allows them to develop compassion for another living being. Caring for, petting, brushing the dogs while they read helps that connection," she said.

Lana Fielding is looking forward to seeing the reading program expand in the area.

"We are going to be working with children of all ages this year, particularly in the Prescott area, from Discovery Gardens to high school students. How you treat an animal can transfer to how you treat people. We teach kindness, body language, needs vs. wants, differences, and more. It's so cool!" she said.

Additionally, "Being able to read and read well builds a strong foundation that will help children as they go through life. Building self confidence and developing appropriate social skills are very important to how you interact with others," she said.


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Therapy Mini Horses







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View Breathtaking Fall Color in Hannagan Meadow Recreation Area

For autumn's golden glory, eastern Arizona around the Hannagan Meadow Recreation Area has no rival.

Our trips from the Prescott area on State Route 260 took us east through picturesque Payson, Show Low, Pinetop/Lakeside, and Eagar/Springerville. Then we headed south on State Route 191, also known as the Coronado Trail National Scenic Byway, and at one time, the Devil's Highway for its twists and turns though dense forests and alpine meadows. This took us into the Apache/Sitgreaves National Forest and through Alpine to Hannagan Meadow.

Hannagan Meadow's name is steeped in folklore, but history says Robert Hannagan was there in the 1870s. Rustic and comfortable Hannagan Meadow Lodge was built in 1926. At an elevation of 9,120 feet, it is the highest point in Arizona inhabited year-round.

I first visited Hannagan Meadow on my own for the much-publicized Mexican gray wolf release in January, 1998. Four-foot deep snow made it necessary to access the release site in tracked Sno-Cat machines, but the entire experience was unequaled. Even dodging all of the major television network, newspaper, and magazine personnel was worth seeing the first endangered wolves leaping from crates into their new habitat.

Eager to share this wondrous part of Arizona with my family, a summer backpacking trip gave us gorgeous days and cold nights. We started on a trail just a couple of miles from the lodge. Day hikes we bushwhacked over much downed deadwood to spot wildflowers, wild strawberries, and wild turkeys.

An October jaunt for my husband and me revealed the most astounding stands of bright yellow aspens. Early foot-deep snow had fallen the day before but melted during that visit, so we managed get in some hikes. A huge pile of bear scat made us alert to our fellow forest inhabitants.

On our way home, we stopped at Escudilla Mountain near Alpine for a quick climb. The break became extended when we discovered the most glorious stand of aspens I'd ever seen covering a bowl on the other side. Breathtaking doesn't begin to describe the unexpected sight.

The devastating Wallow Fire of 2011 destroyed many areas of the Apache/Sitgreaves National Forest. Driven by wind, the fire's damage seems hit and miss. I fear the huge pines surrounding our backpacking camp are gone. But the forest is so massive – more than two million acres extending into New Mexico – you will find more than enough to explore. It contains more than 30 lakes and reservoirs and 1,000

miles of rivers and creeks. The Mogollon Rim, White Mountains, Blue Range Primitive area and the Bear Wallow, Escudilla and Mount Baldy wildernesses are some of its mind-boggling features.

The mountainous forest abounds with large mammals and bird species, but also provides deep cover, so you would be fortunate indeed to spot them. Along with the wolves (grown to about 120 animals in 27 packs throughout Arizona and New Mexico), black bear, mule deer, elk, pronghorn, and bighorn sheep roam while turkey, bald eagle, turkey vulture, and peregrine falcon soar over the Apache/Sitgreaves.

Very likely, you will hear elk bugling in the fall. While exciting, you must beware of hunters during the season. Make your presence known, especially when off-trail. Trails may be safer. Check out the many maps that are available from the forest service and online.

Always check for warnings and advisories on road and weather conditions, along with closure orders and prohibitions, when planning a trip into this rugged and remote area. Do not expect to have cell phone reception.

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YAVAPAI COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE'S NEWEST K9 OFFICER JOINS FORCES WITH K9 HADDIE, THE FORMER "MOUNTIE"

Yavapai County Sheriff's Office's former "Mountie," German Shepherd K9 Haddie, has a new and dedicated handler.

YCSO acquired Haddie from the Royal Canadian Mounted Police after it offered its narcotics K9 Vader to the Arizona Department of Corrections, where he is thriving with an experienced handler.

Vader, handled by Deputy
Stephen Warburton, did not
enjoy interacting with the public,
an important part of the YCSO
K9 program in which children
and adults can talk to and pet
the animals. Haddie, also an
expert narcotics detection dog, is
extremely social and a better fit for
YCSO's K9 Unit.

Haddie was bred and trained by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, or RCMP. When Canada recently legalized marijuana, the RCMP had to shut down its K9 program and start with all new dogs. Warburton said Haddie is only four years old, a high drive working dog that is too young to retire.

"Instead of retiring and being someone's pain in the butt, the RCMP sold her to us at a discount so she could continue to do police work," Warburton said. "Police dogs are not the greatest pets. They get into everything, they are very high drive, and they need to work. It would have been a bit of torture for Haddie to not meet her mental and physical needs."

County Sheriff's Office's Newest K9 Office

YCSO received Haddie in November 2018, and she certified a month later with 100 percent, no errors. The icing on the cake is that Haddie is extremely social. Warburton called her "a big bundle of joy."

Warburton quickly bonded with Haddie, little knowing that in just a few months he would be offered

an opportunity he couldn't turn down – a promotion to the YCSO Criminal Investigations Unit. Unfortunately, that meant releasing Haddie to a new handler.

That new handler is Travis Hartman, a deputy with YCSO since graduating the Northern Arizona Regional Training Academy in 2015

Hartman grew up in a law enforcement family. His father was an Orange County, California Sheriff's Department Deputy for 29 years, Hartman says with pride, asserting that his father's service is what sparked his own desire to enter law enforcement as a career.

Hartman is passionate about taking dangerous drugs off the streets, and he saw the K9 Unit as a natural progression. "I've felt I was good at investigating narcotics crimes, so when I had the chance to become a K9 officer, I wanted to take that next step."

He spent a lot of time preparing himself for when he could add a K9 to his career. "I made it apparent early on that the K9 Unit was something I wanted be a part of, and I geared myself toward that. I let everyone know that's what my focus was."

Hartman said he prepared extensively, hanging out at every opportunity with the K9 officers and learning all he could. He did ride-alongs with K9 teams and studied search and seizure case law. He was absolutely determined to excel. "I don't mean to sound cocky, but my mentality was that no one was going to take that spot from me."

Hartman earned the spot, and began his K9 career at the beginning of May. After all of his work, what he wasn't prepared for was the love kindled between him and his first K9.

"We spent a couple of months getting to know each other and acclimating without really working her. I brought her home, played with her, threw the ball for her, and fed her. I picked up the K9 patrol car and brought her along with me, to get used to riding with me," he said.

"I love this dog, and I've come to realize that I wouldn't be able to

give her up. I'm going to have to retire her," he said. "My favorite thing about her is her personality. She's goofy and friendly, and she loves everyone. Haddie's a lover, and that makes her easy to be around. She loves playing with my kids and my wife."

"I've always grown up with dogs, but I never had a working dog before," Hartman said.


One of the dogs he had growing up was a retired police dog, but Haddie is his first actual experience. She has taught him the actual difference between his working partner and a pet.

"It's different in a lot of aspects, but obviously she has to be kept maintained with a high standard of training. It's more responsibility than just hanging out with a pet."

Haddie doesn't do patrol work. All of the YCSO K9s are strictly narcotics detection dogs, and the department works closely with the Partners Against Narcotics Trafficking (PANT). Haddie's former handler Warburton remembers her unique alert, something Hartman also has observed. She sits, and then she stares, and stares. Hartman calls it her "laser focus."

Just two weeks into the New Year, Haddie, during an exterior search of a vehicle near Cordes Junction, alerted to the odor of drugs within the vehicle. A search turned up a pound of methamphetamines, with a street value of about \$11,000. On February 12, Haddie detected 18 pounds of methamphetamines in another vehicle.

Hartman, while diligently training with Haddie now, will enter the K9 Academy with the Arizona Department of Corrections in October. After that, the sky is clearly the limit for this new K9 deputy and his experienced K9.



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MAD ABOUT MULES



Over the years I have noted equestrians are CRAZY about their horses. But It's becoming apparent today that mule owners are MAD ABOUT MULES!

Let's start with the scientific details, because it's all in the mix. The ingredients of a mule combines one horse with one donkey. The most common blend is a donkey sire with a horse mare. There's also the mix of horse stallion with donkey mare, which is called a hinny. This is not as prevelent as the former. Common breeding combinations include donkey/Quarter horse, donkey/ Arabian, donkey/Thoroughbred, and donkey/draft.

According to mule trainer Eric Parmer, "Today's breeding trend further east and in the midwest is showing more of a gaited influence." They're breeding donkeys with gaited mares with great results. Some barns are breeding the donkey with Warmbloods. But the traits that are most desired tend to come from the donkey makeup, such as being ridiculously smart and wonderfully non-reactive (less spooky).

Eric points out that, "Unlike horses, who are primarily flight animals that run to flee from attack, the donkey part of the mule is calculative. If he cannot outrun his enemy, he will turn to face him and devise a plan."

So how do you train a mule? Eric recommends training and maintaining them. "They think differently than horses. They need consistency and strong leadership. They are thinkers," explains Parmer, who is well versed with plenty of mule training experience. He adds, "They really bond with their owner, more than a horse does."

Wylie Preston is a farrier to the South Rim Grand Canyon packing mules. He explains, "The shape of their foot is different, more straight and with steeper walls, more upright." Mules do not tend to have many foot issues, and their hooves are harder than horses. "Because of their demeanor," says Wylie, "they rarely sit back while tied."

Chris Clark is Lead Mule Packer at the Grand Canyon, South Rim. Mule packing in the Grand Canyon has been going on for over 100 years. And though it may seem like a 'beast of burden' burden, it clearly is not.

"These mules are waiting for you at the gate", Chris states. "They love doing their job and being with their buddies."

The mule packing team has a schedule each day. They maintain the trails, haul dirt, compost the toilets, bring food to Phantom Ranch, and take trash out. Whatever the task, these mules are on a mission. And, whatever the project, Chris knows exactly how to pack them.


Clark can only say, "The mules are super smart." And the mules are well taken care of. In addition to re-

ceiving vaccinations twice a year, they also have annual dentals and farrier visits every six weeks.

At the age of three, Tawn Mangum's family started a business of managing national parks. Today, Tawn, his sisters, and his parents oversee the Grand Canyon North Rim, Zion National Park, and Bryce Canyon, along with the third generation of family members. They manage 230 head of mules and horses, and do they have some great trails!

Local equestrian Marilyn Bocksnick experienced their three-hour ride on a mule named Gus. After her adventure riding down into the canyon and maneuvering switchbacks along the way, Marilyn is convinced that mules are the way to go. "Gus was a very safe, broke, good boy who knew his job and didn't try to pull any shenanigans," reports Marilyn.

Now, if you're thinking that mules are strictly trailbound troopers, you haven't met the likes of Thesebootsweremade4lopin who is the world's first Champion Working Equitation

Expert rider/trainer Reta Conner had not only the vision but the savvy to take this excellent mule and train her to go beyond greatness. So, without hesitation,

Conner dared to sign this molly (mare mule) up for the difficult challenge of Working Equitation at the Andalusion World Cup where she adeptly achieved Reserve Champion at Novice Open Level, a noble accomplishment indeed. Meg Goodyear, having incurred serious horse-related injuries in the past year, decided to take a significant turn in her stable style. "The decision to get a mule was actually prompted by other mule owners," explains Meg.

Her current horse was very reactive, and she knew safety was going to be an issue. After some diligent research she set out to meet her mate.

Miles is more than magnificent. Not only a former endurance mule, Miles is able to carry a flag for parades and accomplishes many trail obstacle feats. But most of all, Miles gives Meg the confidence and trust she needs in a steady steed. Miles is the epitome of extreme safety, extreme fun, and extreme love.

So, if you're in the market for a dynamic domestic equine hybrid, I think you'll agree with the multiplying mob that is crazy mad over mules.




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
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
